Mark Braverman is the author of a groundbreaking new book, *Fatal Embrace: Christians, Jews and the Search for Peace in the Holy Land*. In his book, Mark shows how the Jewish quest for safety and empowerment and the Christian endeavor to atone for centuries of anti-Semitism have combined to suppress the conversations needed to bring about a just and lasting peace in the Holy Land. A Jewish American with strong family roots in Israel, Mark articulates a hopeful and provocative message, finding guidance in the prophets' cry for justice and Jesus' transformative ministry. Mark has devoted himself full-time to the Israel/Palestine conflict, writing and lecturing widely. His courageous, humane, and hopeful message resonates with both Jews and Christians.

Mark is a cofounder and Executive Director of Friends of Tent of Nations North America, a nonprofit dedicated to supporting Palestinian land rights and peaceful coexistence in historic Palestine. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Israeli Committee Against House Demolitions-USA and the advisory committee of Friends of Sabeel North America. He is a charter member of American Jews for a Just Peace.
